# Class Fee 2023-24--\$30—Due by Aug 25

**Course description:** Health Care Delivery and Management introduces delivery and management of health care including professionalism, health care roles, health care delivery models, and types of health care coverage. Explores legal/ethical issues including HIPAA and confidentiality, electronic medical records, and patient rights as well as analysis of current trends in healthcare today.

- 11. Discuss and explain the role of healthcare as it relates to the special needs of minorities, women, children, the uninsured, the homeless, and the disabled.
- 12. List the three cornerstones of healthcare (cost, quality, access) and discuss how they influence our healthcare delivery system.

- 13. Discuss and explain how healthcare policy influences government policy.
- 14. Discuss and explain the future role of our healthcare delivery system.

## **Course requirements:**

# Principles of Health Science
